GRAND HOTEL BAGLIONI

Conferences often take place at the Grand Hotel Baglioni. It's a popular business hotel with a convenient location between the train station and the old town, extra space for large events, though primarily visited by tourists, who appreciate the historical ambience. The Grand Hotel Baglioni is a large freestanding palazzo, which has a long history like many Florentine structures.



It's one of the first buildings to be documented since the 13th century. In the 19th century it has been the prince palace of the Carrega Bertolini family but at the beginning of the 20th century it was converted in a hotel. It was opened on August 12, 1903.

Fans of *Inferno* are in good hands, because here the interior is genuinely presented with all the comforts of a four star hotel: No sooner you pass through the narrow entrance door, you're standing in the lobby that resembles a small church. This feeling continues on the lower residential floors: The rooms are almost medieval in appearance with their high ceilings, dark wood furnishings, and windows, which also have a sacred character, not only in form, but also because of the colored glass and indeed look like church windows in many of the rooms. The lived in feeling becomes brighter with each ascending floor. While searching for modern architecture in the Hotel Baglioni is to no avail, technology and comfort are naturally adapted to 21st century
